Figure 1. MHS graduation rate vs. citywide high school graduation rate²

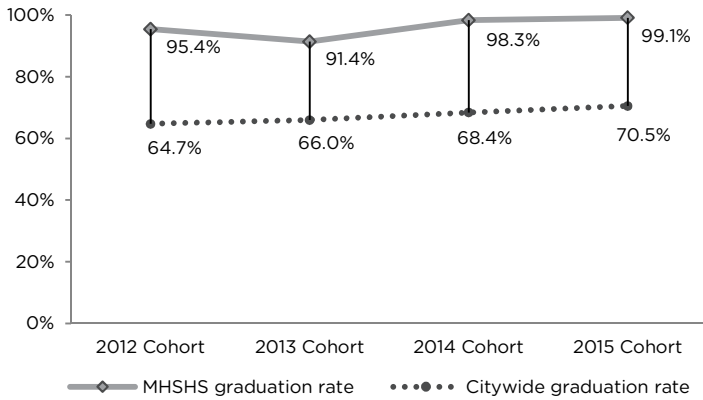
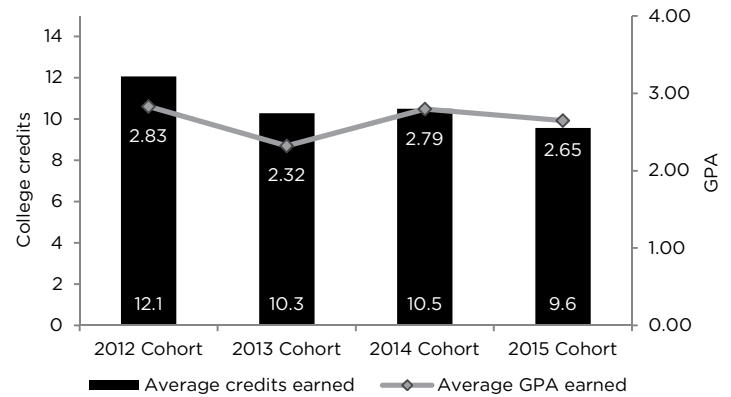


Figure 2. Average college GPA and college credits of graduates

Figure 3. MHS graduates vs. citywide college 6-month enrollment rate^{2,4}

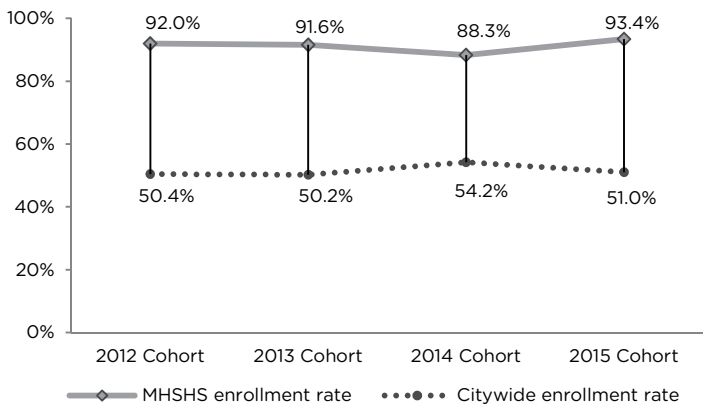
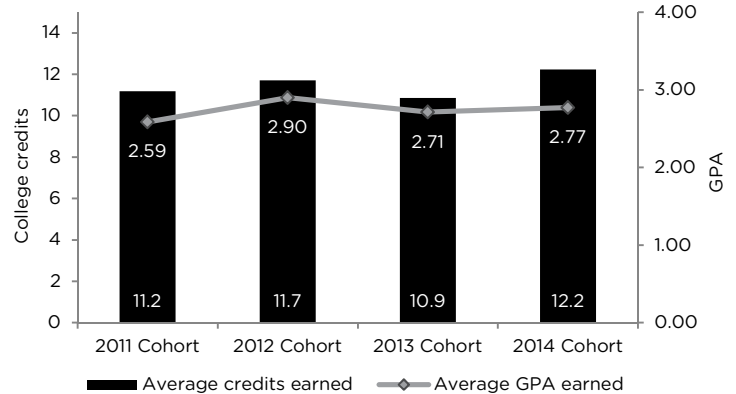


Figure 4. MHS graduates' average Fall semester college GPA and credits^{3,5}
